Nova Scotia entrepreneur wins award for excellence

A Mahone Bay, Nova Scotia business was honoured for its excellence at the Atlantic Aboriginal Entrepreneur Awards Show held on September 9, 2010 at St. Mary's First Nation in Fredericton, New Brunswick.

Alden Darville's Biscuit Eater Café and Bookseller edged out Niro Global Aboriginal Consulting Services of Dartmouth for first place in the Nova Scotia Business of the Year category.

Mahone Bay is a picturesque town on the south shore of Nova Scotia.

Each year the show, which is sponsored by Ulnooweg Development Group Inc., brings together aboriginal entrepreneurs, band business representatives and decision makers from First Nation, Métis and Inuit communities from throughout the Atlantic Region and across Canada.

The finalists for the competition and the winners were celebrated with an evening of Aboriginal entertainment, traditional Maliseet food and a special venue.

St. Mary's First Nation's Chief Candice Paul said the event is "like the Academy Awards for Aboriginal Peoples in Atlantic Canada.

"This show is the place for us to recognize the achievements of each other, and to celebrate the progress we have made as First Nations, and we are honoured to be part of it," she said.

Christopher GooGoo, general manger of Ulnooweg Development Group Inc., said each year the number of nominations for successful aboriginal entrepreneurs is growing in the region.

"This promising sign of continued aboriginal business development fuels our efforts and makes us proud and honoured to be part of that success," he said.

Presenters at this year's event included Keith Ashfield, minister of the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), and New Brunswick Lt.-Gov. Graydon Nicholas.
