Two British Columbians inducted into Aboriginal Business Hall of Fame

The Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business' (CCAB) 2011 Aboriginal Business Hall of Fame Awards this year go to British Columbians Clarence Louie and Ruth Williams.

Louie is Chief of the Osoyoos Indian Band. Williams is Chief Executive Officer of the Aboriginal-owned All Nations Trust Company (ANTCO) in Kamloops.

The Aboriginal Business Hall of Fame (ABHF) is in its 7th year of recognizing the outstanding achievements of Aboriginal business leaders from across Canada. The ABHF award recognizes individual achievement and the successes of the current and past laureates indicate the growing strength and prominence of the Aboriginal business community in Canada.

Chief Clarence Louie was also named a Transformational Canadian by the Globe & Mail.

Ruth Williams has overseen the provision of over 1300 loans to Aboriginal people in B.C. and an increase in ANTCO value from \$339,000 to over \$15 million. She has also played a leadership role in the formation of eight non-profit organizations

The Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business (CCAB) was founded in 1984 and is committed to the full participation of Aboriginal people in Canada's economy.
